TOURNAMENT: SPRING TROPHY ROCKFISH May 2021

Greetings NNAC Members,

Happy May to all NNAC members! At least I hope you are currently happy even though the weather gods have put a severe hammering on our first tournament of 2021. Opening day of trophy rockfish season saw a brutal May 1 start of wind and high seas. That pattern continued pretty much unabated for six days straight days as small craft advisories dominated the news.

As I write this, starting the second weekend of the tournament, we've lost another day today due to high winds. Sunday, May 11 looks better, so at least we might get one official tournament day recorded during the first two weekends.

But although some of us have been able to get out during the week on charter boats, none of that counts as far as our NNAC trophy rockfish tournament. We did make some observations I'd like to share here. One, there are not a lot of people fishing. On the third day of the trophy season, we had four boats fishing around us and the conditions were not bad at all. In fact, it was nearly flat in the afternoon. The next day was a Tuesday and they were maybe 30 boats in the Potomac but nothing like I've seen in years past. Maybe the forecast of severe weather had something to do with that. A special thanks to Ryan Rogers and Doug Gray who worked very hard trying to find fish for us on their excellent charter boat the Midnight Sun. And we did dodge a Northern Neck tornado when we got back in but that's another story for another day.

The forecast for rockfish populations this spring did not look good and in fact I'm afraid that's what we are seeing. Of course, Virginia canceled their trophy season altogether for the second straight year.

Maryland and the Potomac are open, but I've not seen many fish. Tom and I were able to take part in two charters this week and we had mixed results. One day was decent and the other day was one fish only. One of our members has fished the Potomac on his own boat a couple of days and found one fish yesterday.

It's obvious the Potomac area sport fishing fleet numbers out trying to catch trophy rockfish is way down. That is partially because of the weather but I was out there on some pretty nice afternoons during the week and there just were not many boats out. We are guessing some of the sport fish population think it's just not worth it with current fishery population numbers. We may not even have a trophy rockfish season in the Potomac, Maryland, or Virginia next year if it continues like this. That's not a scientific observation, only our educated guess.

Regulations Changes

No regulation changes to report in any of the tournament zones. Regulations sometime change during the season so always check regulations in your zone before keeping a fish.

Fishing Safety

As the weather warms up, we have seen more boats out but again, the weekend weather has not provided great conditions for fishing or cruising so far. But that hasn't stopped a number of reported boat accidents with fatalities in the Chesapeake. I think it's important to point these out so that we continue to realize vigilance is always necessary as the Bay is unforgiving of inattention and a relaxed boating attitude. The continued lessons we always seem to note during these boating accident recaps is that life preservers do save lives. It's always sad to note how many people are lost in the Bay because something simple like a life preserver is not worn. Spend \$150 on an inflatable and you will forget you have it on.

From John O'Conner currently languishing in Florida:

FWC Releases 2020 Boating Accident Statistical Report

With the release of the 2020 Boating Accident Statistical Report, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) encourages boaters to focus on taking the necessary steps for a safer boating experience.

"A leading contributor to boating accidents is the operator's inattention or failure to maintain a proper lookout, said Lt. Seth Wagner, FWC Boating and Waterways Section. "Many operators believe they are looking around, but they are not recognizing potential hazards or are distracted by dividing their attention between things like electronic devices or other occupants in the boat."

In 2020, 402 boating accidents involved collisions and 44% of them were due to the operator's inattention or failing to maintain a proper lookout. "It is important for boaters to keep in mind that a vessel should be treated with the same responsibility as a car or truck so everyone can enjoy Florida's beautiful waters," Wagner said.

Florida had 836 boating accidents in 2020, which is 113 more accidents than in 2019, a 16% increase. A total of 79 people lost their lives last year in boating accidents, 14 more than the previous year. Since 2003, falling overboard has been the leading type of fatal accident with drowning as the leading cause of death. Of the drowning victims, 88% were not wearing a life jacket. Today's boaters can choose from several models of light and comfortable, inflatable belt-pack or over-the-shoulder life jackets that can be worn while fishing or enjoying the sun. Events can happen quickly and unexpectedly, and boaters might not have time to grab their life jacket before finding themselves in the water. The message is clear, "Life Jackets Save Lives."
